

WITNESS TELLS OF 'WILD RIDE'

Edgar Dawn, 2201 First Av., described in Police Court yesterday an automobile ride he said he never will forget.

Dawn was hit June 22 at First Avenue and Yesler Way by an automobile driven by Adolph C. Sanger, 28 years old, of 2330 California Ave. A group of bystanders put Dawn in Sanger's car and suggested the latter lead for a hospital.

"I kept begging the driver to take me to a hospital, but he seemed dumb," Dawn testified. "I had been knocked galley west when the car struck me and I took an awful crack on the head. Finally the driver let me out under the bridge at Fourth Avenue and Yesler Way and went to the police station when I started taking the license number of the car the driver asked me how I'd like to be beaten up."

Police Traffic Sgt. Victor Kramer, who sent Dawn from police headquarters to Harborview County Hospital in police car, testified Sanger was under the influence of alcohol.

Sanger told Judge Devin he drove around with Dawn because "I was so nervous I didn't know what to do."

Devin fined Sanger \$100 and suspended his operator's license for one year on a reckless-driving charge.

WALLGREN BACKS MAGNESITE PLAN

United States Senator Conrad C. Wallgren said today he would recommend adoption of the Washington State College process for recovering magnesium to the special Senate committee investigating contracts under the national-defense program.

Senator Wallgren will join the committee in San Francisco Tuesday, showing samples of magnesite and ingots of magnesium from a pilot plant at Pullman.

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'CUPID HELPER' FIGHTS OUSTER

Things looked pretty black today for William E. Whittig, marriage runner in the Courthouse, but he said "he was determined to fight attempts of County Auditor Robert A. Morris and County Commissioner Russell H. Flunt to oust him."

Flunt's aides yesterday removed all the physical effects of Whittig's "office," a cubbyhole off the second-floor corridor near Morris' office. It is from this "office" that Whittig has launched forth daily to induce marrying couples—coming from Morris' office—to patronize two of the four justices in the building for the wedding ceremony.

As another development, the State Supreme Court yesterday upheld the auditor's refusal to give a marriage license—after the necessary three-day wait—to Justice Charles E. Claypool instead of directly to the persons applying for the license.

The test case arose April 3, while Earl Millikin, now mayor, still was auditor. In pleading before the Justices in the Bureau of Mines, Wallgren said that while metal-urgists in the Bureau of Mines will decide the technical questions, "I feel safe to say that the proposition looks good," the senator added.

Seeking to aid national-defense production on Puget Sound, five organizations representing employers and employees today invited Sidney Hillman, associate director of the Office of Production Management, to address a meeting here soon.

Hillman was asked to set his own date for a meeting in Seattle or Tacoma. The invitation was extended by P. Thymian, president of the Manufacturers' Association of Washington; James A. Taylor, president of the Washington State Federation of Labor; Richard Francis, regional director of the Congress of Industrial Organizations; Emil G. Sick, president of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce; and J. J. Kaufman, president of the Tacoma Chamber of Commerce.

Supporting letters were sent by Gov. Arthur B. Langlie, Mayor Carl Millikin of Seattle and Mayor Harry P. Cain of Tacoma.

"No one recognizes more than you do the importance of the Pacific Northwest, and particularly the Puget Sound area, to national-defense production," the sponsoring organizations advised Hillman. "This region has the responsibility for producing a tremendous volume of equipment and supplies for the safety of the entire United States."
